# Writing Activity: Evaluate an Argument

**Directions:** Analyze the selections in this cluster, looking for information, claims, and evidence that have a bearing on the issue of the rights of the Nazis to march in Skokie. Then closely read the arguments Anthony Lewis lays out on that topic in the selection "Thoughts That We Hate." Evaluate the arguments the courts made on the Skokie march. You might present your evaluation in a chart or discuss it in an essay.

### Writing Activity: Evaluate an Argument

- Start by writing a paragraph that summarizes the arguments Lewis lays out on First Amendment rights in "Thoughts That We Hate."
- Review the selections in Cluster 1, keeping in mind the cluster's essential question ("How would society be different without the First Amendment?") as you re-read each text.
- Identify quotes or details in each reading that have a bearing on the right of the Nazis to march in Skokie. You can use the graphic organizer on the next two screens to collect your thoughts.
