## TEACHING PLAN

Objective To spell words that demonstrate these sound-letter relationships: /ch/ch, tch; /th/th.

1. Write these three lists of words on the chalkboard:

chase	pitcher	bathe
spinach	catcher	rather
chat	scratch	feather

Then ask the students what each list has in common. (The words in the first list all have the sound /ch/ spelled ch; the words in the second all have the sound /ch/ spelled tch; the words in the third have /th/ spelled th.) Explain that /ch/ is most often spelled with the consonant digraph ch. Review the definition of consonant digraph. Point out that /ch/ spelled tch occurs at the end of a word or syllable after a short vowel sound. The sound /th/ is always spelled with the consonant digraph th. Ask the students if they can identify another sound spelled th. (unvoiced /th/, as in bath)

You may wish to introduce the lesson by using Spelling Generalizations Slide 13.

- 2. Direct the students to read the generalization on page 64 independently.
- 3. Have volunteers read the Unit words aloud and identify the letters that spell /ch/ and /th/. Direct the students' attention to the box before the word machine, and ask a volunteer to identify the sound spelled ch in machine. (/sh/)
- 4. Ask a student to read Remember This at the bottom of the page aloud.

You may wish to assign ELL Practice Master 15 for reinforcement in writing spelling words.

### The Unit Words

A consonant digraph is two letters together that stand for one sound.

Say the word chat, and listen to the beginning sound. The consonant digraph ch stands for the sound /ch/. The Unit words show another way to spell /ch/. In pitcher and catcher you spell /ch/ with tch.

Say the word gather, and listen to the sound the consonant digraph th stands for. The sound /th/ is always spelled with th.


The letters ch together usually spell the sound /ch/. But in machine, you use ch to spell the sound /sh/.

# REMEMBER THIS

Whether you say /hweth/ər/ or /weth/ər/, remember to write the word with wh. Who, what, why, where, when, and whether all begin with wh.
